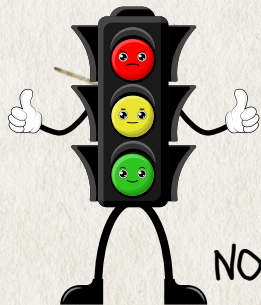

seek.

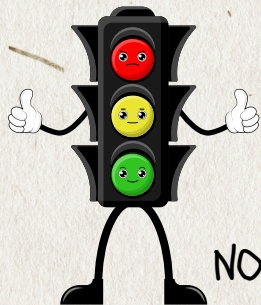
Stop! This area is

## DON'T HIDE, BE VISIBLE

The back or the immediate front of a car is the most dangerous place to hide. When you crouch down or stand right next to a car, the person in the driver's seat can never see you. Next to that huge pile of metal, you remain tiny, and the mirrors won't show you.



## THE WHITE LIGHT WARNING

If the white lights at the back of a parked car are on, it means: "Watch out! I'm reversing!" The driver might not notice you while looking backward.



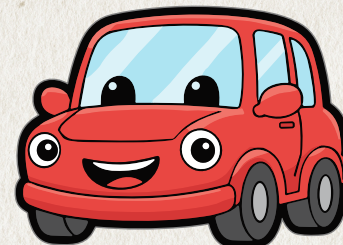

## THE EYE CONTACT RULE

When passing by or behind a vehicle, try to see the driver's face. If you cannot see the driver's eyes in the mirror, know that they cannot see you either. Never enter a vehicle's path without making eye contact with the driver. Always pass from a safe distance.

## THE SILENT DANGER

Cars used to make a "vroom" sound when running, but now some cars (electric ones) are as silent as ghosts. Even if you don't hear an engine sound, a stationary car can move suddenly. That's why parking lots are never playgrounds.
